Members were able to disclose to the meeting any disclosable pecuniary interest they may have in any matter on the agenda for the meeting, where that interest is not already entered in their appointing authority's register of interests, and any other pecuniary or non-pecuniary interests in any such matter that Members may wish to disclose.

No declarations were made.

### 57. MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

The Minutes from the 20 October 2023 meeting were confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

The Chairman reported that the Minutes of the Confirmation Hearing held on 7 December 2023 would be considered at the next meeting.

### 58. QUESTIONS AND DEPUTATIONS

No questions or deputations were received by the Panel on this occasion.

#### 59. CHAIRMAN'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Chairman gave the following announcements:

### Letter from the Home Office

A letter was received on 9 January 2024 from the Home Office, regarding plans to improve support to Police and Crime Panels by implementing a new Best Practice Hub. The Hub will be hosted by a local authority and funded by the

Home Office. The Home Office will be inviting bids from host local authorities who would like to host the Hub in early 2024 and intended to award the successful host local authority by April 2024.

### Legal Support to the Panel

A letter had been sent to all Local Authorities represented on the Panel, inviting them to submit an expression of interest in the contract for legal support to the Panel, due to the current contract expiring at the end of March 2024. A report would be brought to the next meeting in March to confirm the outcome of this process, to enable a new contract to be in place for April.

### **Precept Briefings**

Two briefings had been provided for all Panel Members to support scrutiny of the precept at this meeting. At a briefing in early December Members heard from the Chief Finance Officer to the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner regarding how the budget was put together. A further briefing was held the previous week at which the figures used for the proposed budget and precept were outlined. The sessions were intended to support an informed debate at this meeting.

### Welcome

The Chairman welcomed Kate Gunson to her first Hampshire & Isle of Wight Police and Crime Panel meeting as Chief of Staff of the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner.

### 60. POLICE AND CRIME PANEL - RECRUITMENT TO INDEPENDENT CO-OPTED MEMBER POSITIONS

The Panel received a report from the Democratic Services Officer regarding recruitment to the Independent Co-opted Member positions on the Panel (see Item 6 in the Minute Book). The Chairman reported that the recruitment task & finish group (Cllr Woodward, Cllr Achwal and Cllr Renyard) held interviews in early January and were pleased to present appointments for approval. Panel Members congratulated both individuals on their appointments.

#### **RESOLVED:**

That the Panel agrees the appointment of Trevor Cartwright to the Independent Co-opted Member vacancy on the Panel, to start immediately.

That the Panel agrees the appointment of Shirley Young to continue in the second Independent Co-opted Member role for a further term commencing from the AGM in Summer 2024.

That the term of office for both Independent Co-opted Members will now run until the AGM of the Panel in 2028.

### 61. POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Chairman invited announcements from the Commissioner, who gave an overview of activity undertaken by her and her office during the previous quarter

(it was noted that a written form of the announcements had been circulated to Panel members) Highlights included:

- The PCC hosted an inaugural Cybersecurity and Fraud Summit for business leaders in partnership with the National Crime Agency, the Constabulary, the South East Cyber Resilience Centre and the banking industry.
- The PCC officially opened Cowes Police Station on the Isle of Wight to the public. The station is the first of 10 the Commissioner pledged to open over the next 18 months.
- The Commissioner launched the first ever Hampshire & Isle of Wight Local Bobby scheme. Every community now has access to named and contactable police officers via a dedicated webpage hosted by the Constabulary.
- Wait times when calling 101 had been in the bottom quartile nationally last year and this had been improved to now being in the top 5 in the country.
- As Chairman of the Association of Police and Crime Commissioners the PCC had given evidence at a Parliamentary Select Committee to input to a review of PCCs 12 years on from their introduction.

Panel Members asked questions for clarification and heard that:

 Crime rates were reducing due to the new operating model, however it was aknowledged it would take time for this to influence confidence in the police from the public.

Regarding the increase in police officers, the Chairman asked if figures could be provided to demonstrate the total number of officers in post three years ago compared to today, to evidence if overall numbers had gone up given the numbers leaving the profession as well as those recruited. It was agreed that figures could be provided following the meeting.

### 62. POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER - 2024/25 PRECEPT

The Panel received the Police and Crime Commissioner's proposed precept for 2024/25 and supporting financial information (see Item 8 in the Minute Book). Under the Police and Crime Panels Regulations 2012 the Panel was required to review the proposed precept.

The Chief Finance Officer for the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner gave a presentation outlining the key elements of the proposed budget for 2024/25. Members heard that:

- The amount of central government grant award for Hampshire & the Isle of Wight had increased, however the majority of the increase was committed to fund pensions and the pay award.
- No progress had been made on reviewing the funding formula for how central government grant was allocated to different force areas.
- 6,000 responses had been received to the consultation undertaken on the precept of which 64% were willing for the policing element of Council Tax to increase, with 31% favouring no increase.

- The Chief Constable had recommended the maximum increase of £13 however the Commissioner was proposing an increase of £10.
- 61% of households in Hampshire & the Isle of Wight were in properties in bands A to C and therefore would pay less than £10.
- Hampshire was below average for police precept compared to other forces and funding per head of population was third from the bottom compared to other force areas.
- Of the budget 90% went to the Constabulary and of that 75% funded salaries.
- Inflation assumptions were based on national estimates. There was an element of risk with this, therefore a reserve was in place in case inflation was higher than expected.
- In the medium term there was a budget pressure in future years when the 650 new officers recently recruited reach a pay increment with a significant percentage pay increase. There were also future costs associated with the transition to electric vehicles.

The Chief Constable of Hampshire and Isle of Wight Constabulary (the Constabulary) was invited to provide Members with the operational context for the budget (see Appendix A to the report). Members heard that:

- The new policing model had been in place for seven months and already there was evidence that crime rates were reducing.
- There had been scrutiny of how the planned budget would be spent.
- The maximum increase had been sought in order to generate as much funding as possible to continue keeping people as safe as possible.

The Commissioner presented her proposed precept for 2024/25, which recommended an increase of £10 per annum for Band D properties and would focus on keeping the residents of Hampshire and the Isle of Wight safe, meeting inflationary costs and proposed to provide an additional 75 police officers across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight to enhance policing visibility.

The Commissioner highlighted to Members that:

- She recognised that there was a cost of living crisis and was mindful that
  a significant proportion of those responding to the consultation favoured
  no increase. Therefore she had decided to propose an increase lower
  than the maximum.
- If a high pay award was agreed nationally for police officers any additional funding required would be funded by the Home Office.

The Chairman then moved to invite questions from Members. In response to questions it was heard that:

- If the precept was increased by £13 instead of £10 this would provide an additional £2 million per year. The precept had been increased at a high level for the past few years. Any additional funding would largely be spent on extra officers which would take time to have impact.
- The percentage of the overall policing budget funded by Council Tax compared to the percentage funded by central government grant had shifted over time from 68% by government grant in 2010/11 to 59% in 2024/25.

- An efficiency programme was considered as part of the budget setting process including projects such as investment in technology in order to free up officer time from administrative tasks.
- The numbers responding to the consultation were lower than the previous year, however it was considered that this reflected the public being less concerned about policing and that greater numbers would have responded if they had concerns.
- Inflation was considered against each line item in the budget as it could vary for different items and in some cases inflation was built in to contracts at a certain level. The majority of the budget is spent on pay so this was the highest risk area.
- The population of Hampshire & the Isle of Wight was around 2 million therefore the responses received equated to around 0.3% of the population.
- The Chief Constable was confident recruitment to an additional 75 officers could be achieved and noted there was a focus on retention to reduce the ongoing recruitment need.

Following questions, the Chairman moved to debate. Members discussed the precept proposal, raising issues such as:

- Concern regarding the funding position that pressure was being moved from central government grant to Council Tax and that the funding formula had still not been reviewed.
- Disappointment that an option to support the Chief Constable's preference of a £13 increase was not available.
- Was the spend good value for money, given examples where there had been a lack of police response to anti social behaviour.
- The impact of the new Chief Constable had been positive over the past vear.
- Concern that inappropriate 101 demand and involvement in health and social care issues was drawing police resource away from their core responsibilities.

As a result of the debate the Chairman proposed an additional recommendation to those included in the report, that a letter be sent to the Secretary of State and Shadow Secretary of State to highlight the Panel's concerns about the level of central government funding and the need for a funding formula review, and that this could be done jointly between the Panel and the Commissioner.

The Chairman put the recommendations to the vote and the vote was carried by 9 in favour and 4 against. It was therefore

#### RESOLVED:

#### That the Panel:

- 1. Supports a precept increase of £10 per annum for Band D properties, which is the equivalent of £0.83 per month, or 19p per week and is in line with inflation at 3.98%.
- 2. Notes the recommendations from the Chief Constable on the operational requirements for 2024/25 onwards, and the request that the PCC

- supports a precept increase to enable the delivery of those requirements, as set out in Appendix A.
- 3. Notes that consultation has been undertaken over to determine the public support for a precept increase, and that the overall collective outcome of the consultation shows that there is majority support for a precept increase, but with a notable minority of 31% supporting no increase,
- 4. Notes that 61% of households across Hampshire & IoW (HIOW) are in properties in council tax bands A-C, and would therefore see a precept increase of less than £10 per annum as set out in Appendix C.
- 5. Notes that the precept in HIOW in 23/24 was £9.81 below the national average police precept and as the referendum limit is £13 for Band D properties, the HIOW precept is still expected to be below the national average.
- 6. Note that the total uplift in police officer numbers in HIOW over the three-year period 2020/21 to 2022/23 delivered through the Government's Uplift programme was 498, but that with the support of the PCC, Hampshire and Isle of Wight Constabulary (HIOWC) is on track to actually deliver 650 new officers in total by April 2024. The officers funded in the 2024/25 budget will be in addition to the 650, taking the total additional officer numbers to 725 by March 2025.
- 7. That a joint letter be sent from the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Police and Crime Panel and the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Police and Crime Commissioner to the relevant Secretary of State and Shadow Secretary of State, to highlight concerns regarding the level of central government funding received by Hampshire & the Isle of Wight for policing.
- 8. That delegated authority is given to the Democratic Services Officer supporting the Panel, in consultation with the Chairman, to formally report the views of the Panel on the precept proposal to the Commissioner in writing.

### 63. POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER - POLICE AND CRIME PLAN PERFORMANCE AND DELIVERY

Members received some advance slides and a presentation from the representative of the Office of the Police and Crime Commssioner, setting out an update on delivery against the Police and Crime Plan 2021-2024 (see Item 9 in the Minute Book). This update included a focus on the priority in the Plan regarding 'Zero Tolerance on Knife Crime'. The presentation responded to areas identified by the Panel in a letter provided to the Commissioner in advance.

It was reported that a stop and search scrutiny panel was in place which included reviewing Body Worn Video. It was highlighted that the Violence Reduction Unit (VRU) commissioned work to embed Trauma Informed practice across public services. This was aimed at preventing trauma experienced by young people having a negative effect on their future behaviour. The VRU commissioned interventions aimed at reducing knife crime through increasing evidence based protective factors and decreasing evidence based risk factors for involvement in violence, including Choices, A&E Navigators, Trauma Informed Practitioners and RESET. The VRU was part of a national network which involved sharing good practice.

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That the update on performance and delivery of the Commissioners Police and Crime Plan is noted.

### 64. POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER - EFFECTIVE AND EFFICIENT POLICING

The Panel received an update on the Police and Crime Commissioner scrutinising the work of the Constabulary to ensure Effective and Efficient Policing for the Hampshire & Isle of Wight area.

### RESOLVED:

The update on how the Police and Crime Commissioner is ensuring Effective and Efficient Policing for the Hampshire & Isle of Wight area was noted.

### 65. POLICE AND CRIME PANEL - WORK PROGRAMME

Members received a report from the Democratic Services Officer to the Panel setting out the proposed work programme for the Panel (see Item 11 in the Minute Book).







### **VAWG Partnership Board**

The vision to reduce the harm caused by VAWG jointly with HIOWC and key partners will be achieved through strong collaborative working between specialist service providers (ensuring the presence of the victim and survivor voice at all times), Criminal Justice, Health Partners, Local Authorities and commissioners. The partnership works together to increase trust and confidence, whilst ensuring appropriate support for survivors and those at risk. This includes social, physical, emotional and psychological support. Enforcement action is taken against those causing harm.

The VAWG Partnership Board aims to ensure the availability of specialist support for victims, a robust policing and criminal justice response, a reduction in re-offending, and prevention of offending through early intervention and prevention.


### **Domestic Homicide Reviews (DHR)**

The OPCC has undertaken a review of all DHRs across the HIOW area since they were first legislated in April 2011, meeting with 57 individuals and conducting 48 interviews across 36 different organisations.

This provided the ability to cross reference a thematic analysis of all DHRs and DHR recommendations, with police data and dip sampling from the Home Office DHR Library.

The recommendations from these reviews informs potential lessons learnt across themes including (but not limited to):

- Training and awareness raising
- Information sharing
- Case management systems
- · Improved multi-agency working
- Service provision
- Policy development / review
- Risk management

### **Project Foundation**

Project Foundation is the multi-agency response to repeat and serial perpetrators of Domestic Abuse (DA).

The whole system approach being undertaken by Police and Partners aims to reduce re-offending, encourage behavioural change in DA perpetrators to develop healthy and respectful relationships with intimate partners, and prevent future harm to victims.

Following partnership consultation, a method has been devised to analyse police crime data across all risk levels, to identify a rolling monthly cohort of perpetrators for management by District Priority Crime Teams and partners.

Following adoption for management as part of Project Foundation, District Priority Crime Teams will work with The Hampton Trust and Stop Domestic Abuse to create the risk management plan based on the four pillars – supervision, monitoring and control, interventions and treatment, and victim safety.

The Hampton Trust and Stop Domestic Abuse will support District Priority Crime Teams to engage DA perpetrators, motivate them to connect with specialist services to reduce risk aligned to the 7 pathways to prevent reoffending.

The provider will also encourage the perpetrator to seek long term support for their abusive behaviour through engaging with DA perpetrator programmes.

This will complement Police activity centred on disruption and enforcement

### **Victim Care Hub**

The Victim Care Hub, designed and funded by the Commissioner, is a brand new approach to supporting victims across the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Constabulary area.

Four Victim Care Hubs have been embedded in police stations geographically spread across the two counties bringing policing and support for victims under one roof for the first time.

The hubs are based in the largest police stations across the two counties:

- · Newport Police Station on the Isle of Wight
- Eastern Police Investigation Centre in Portsmouth
- Western Police Investigation Centre in Southampton
- Northern Police Investigation Centre in Basingstoke

The hubs are staffed by Victim Support teams and specialist support from providers commissioned by the PCC who focus on providing bespoke support for victims of domestic abuse and sexual crimes, as well as support for children and young people.

The Commissioner has provided £850,000 per year from Feb 2024 to March 2029. The money has been allocated from the annual Ministry of Justice Victims Core Grant Fund budget which forms part of the overall Commissioning budget.

The PCC continues to be a voice locally and nationally for women and girls in terms of VAWG. The PCC has actively engaged with local and national media in order to reassure the public that cases reported such as the David Carrick case, and the outcomes of the Baroness Casey review are not the standards expected of policing and that she will be holding HIOWC to account over their approach to vetting and misconduct.





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### Police & Crime Plan Objectives:

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### **Integrated Care Partnership and Violence Reduction Unit (VRU)**

The PCC is a member of the Integrated Care Partnership which enables challenge to link health care to individuals at risk of entering the CJ system. The VRU challenges partners through the Violence Reduction Partnership, sharing data and seeking to understand the links between heath outcomes and serious violence.

### Mental Health Deployment Coordinator funded by the PCC

A 12-month post supporting the Police Control Room and South Central Ambulance Service (SCAS). This post ensures incidents relating to mental health where action needs to be taken are attended by the appropriate agency.

They will seek early advice from the 24/7 Mental Health Triage Service, and work directly with the SCAS & IOW ambulance control rooms to make best use of the underused MH Rapid Response Vehicles.

They will coordinate and book Secure Ambulance activity, and ensure that unused resources relocate to areas of potential demand with a view to Police resources being able to promptly withdraw if the Secure Ambulance is required.

They will upskill and embed knowledge and process into the control rooms (Police and SCAS), improving service delivery live time, and also ensure that there is not a vacuum of skills at the end of the 12 month period.

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
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### **VRU Strategic Needs Assessment:**

The ecological framework considers violence to be the outcome of an interaction between several factors, operating at all four levels:

- The Individual Level: includes being a victim of childhood maltreatment, alcohol or substance abuse and a history of aggressive behaviour.
- The Relationship Level: family, friends, partners and peers all influence and individual's likelihood in becoming involved in violence.
- The Community Level: includes unemployment, population density, and the prevalence of local drugs trades.
- The Societal Level: primarily concerns with whether society as a whole inhibits or exacerbates the likelihood of an individual becoming involved in violence.



### Police & Crime Plan Objectives:

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There has been considerable activity around reviewing and refreshing the training input that is VAWG related. Actions arising from review as follows:

- New Rape / SSO Lesson has been developed for PSI's around rape/SSO. The lesson plan covers rape myths, trauma informed language and role of partners and actions on including discussion about Witness Assessment Booklet.
- OP Modify The College of Policing have a VAWG digital model which will be an additional unit under Op Modify. It can be undertaken individually as a standalone module.
- Victim Code An online learning module update which will be mandated and then will integrate the victim code key messages into all our normal training programs as BAU. Key changes around this included:
  - Recording and measuring officers (accountability)
  - A Victim Contact Management Module to record victims information on RMS rather than the Primary Investigation Report
  - Victim needs Assessment is required for every investigation this assessment will follow them through the Criminal Justice Journey to Court.
  - Increased knowledge of the 12 rights of the Victims Code and recognise minimum standards
  - Increased understanding / awareness of the Victim Satisfaction Surveys completed in force

### Police & Crime Plan Objectives:

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Probation have approximately 130 people with Lived Experience who have expressed interest in being involved in consultation / feedback activities. This is a diverse cohort in terms of age, gender, ethnicity and offence/sentence type. Some engage regularly with Probation via their 3 face to face forums or Hampshire Constabulary's online panel and the OPCC is able to access this resource in person, on-line, on a 1-1 basis, or in focus groups. This could be utilised for a host of reasons including consulting on policy or helping to shape commissioned services.

Of note in this area is the work with Winchester Prison for the 'Choices Programme'. Prisoners worked to develop a film which will be used to give an input to year 6/7 children in Hampshire and the IOW. The PCC has signed certificates for prisoners who have participated in this programme.



The PCC held the APCC portfolio for Serious and Organised Crime jointly until she was announced as Chair in July 2023. In this role she attended the national governance structures for SOC and influenced key decision makers within the National Crime Agency, Home Office for the National SOC Strategy, and Regional Organised Crime Unit (ROCU) transformation.

The Modern Slavery Partnership Strategy serves to inform local communities about serious and organised crime in this area.

HIOWC's Annual Strategic Assessment establishes the risks and opportunities to identify the top priorities. There are strategic owners for each priority and an action plan of delivery and intelligence requirements

Every month priorities are reviewed in force from a tactical perspective around operational activity and also regionally. As APCC Joint SOC Lead, the PCC received guarterly in-person briefings from the NCA on crime types such as Drug Trafficking and Organised Immigration Crime.

The Head of the Regional Organised Crime Unit provides quarterly in-depth briefings to the PCC and CC to understand the current risk and threat to the county, instilling confidence in the Joint Operations Unit (JOU).



The PCC has chaired the LCJB since taking office in 2021. The LCJB brings partners together to deliver a fair and efficient CJS, focusing on services for victims and witnesses of crime, and the prevention and rehabilitation of offenders. The LCJB seeks to raise confidence in the CJS, including improving safety and feelings of safety.

The PCC leads the LCJB to achieve this by:

- · Influencing at a national level
- Challenging and holding each other to account with honesty, energy and transparency
- Developing positive relationships

Section 28 (s28) pre-recorded cross examination evidence is a standard consideration in all RASSO cases with training provided to all officers (in liaison with the CPS).

Following a review of best practice in capturing victim evidence, the Chair of the CJS Efficiency Board confirmed that the use of s28 is appropriate with the understanding that it shouldn't be used for the sake of it, but where it is appropriate. It has to be in the best interests of the victim and those decisions are being made correctly.

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- Ensure Hampshire Constabulary assess and deliver best ωpractice in working with victims to capture evidence, including consideration of remote evidence centres.
- Ensure that all officers and staff dealing with violence and sexual assaults against females receive training so they know how to best support victims of these sensitive crimes.

Yellow Door delivered a Trauma Informed training programme in October 2023 to approximately 100 delegates within HIOWC.

The Home Office set a target of 55 delegates to have completed the RASSO Investigators Development Programme (RISDP) for Hampshire and IOW.

HIOWC enrolled 442 delegates across investigations (specialist and non-specialist). 134 are shown as having fully completed the program. There is value in having an increased awareness across a broad audience around the first four modules alone which re-enforce the idea of offending starts with offenders.

HIOWC are now planning how they can deliver the RISDP Frontline Responders training released in Autumn 2023. This represents a significant investment in the workforce which has not necessarily been replicated by other Forces but is one of the reasons why HIOWC are improving.



- Weekly attachments to the Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH) by all student officers
- Initial training to all new PCs, PCSOs and PSIs

OPCC commissioned services for children and young people include:

- Independent Sexual Violence Advisor (ISVA) Service for Hampshire
- Frankie Worker & Sexual Violence Therapeutic Service
- Victim Care Hub Multi-crime support Pan-Hampshire (all age)
- Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC) Crisis Worker (13+)
- · Domestic Abuse (DA) victim service
- · Portsmouth DA victims
- · Southampton DA and Sexual Crime Victims

The change of policing model includes Missing, Locate, Trace teams for each area. The MASH has prepared a training package for partners including all those who deal with vulnerable children (SWs, schools, GPs, etc.) including information sharing to protect vulnerable children and vulnerable adults which police are delivering in Southampton, Portsmouth and the Isle of Wight.



Fraud or cyber crime is reported to Action Fraud as the UK's national reporting centre. The Cyber Crime Unit and Economic Crime Unit within HIOWC receive weekly reports. The Economic Crime Unit score their cases against a victim vulnerability matrix with the most vulnerable people receiving support. The Cyber Crime team will contact and visit 100% of the victims and provide protection advice to victims.

PCSOs are knowledgeable about Cyber offences and safeguarding and provide advice to victims and signpost them to other services such as the Cyber Bobby Scheme (Blue Lamp Trust).

One of the objectives for the Multi Agency Approach to Fraud (MAAF) is to discuss how we can collectively investigate or disrupt fraud e.g. how scammers communicate through social media, WhatsApp, dating sites etc. and raise awareness of key messages with the public. HIOWC now have a safeguarding role funded by the PCC which includes giving advice to victims and facilitating engagement events e.g. community groups.

The OPCC planned and hosted a business focussed Cybersecurity & Fraud Summit on 16<sup>th</sup> October 2023 as part of the Safer Business Action Week and Cyber Awareness week. This event had input from HIOWC, UK Finance, SECRC and the NCA.

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## Police & Crime Plan Objectives:

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- Reduce the vulnerability of our children and young people when online, by raising the awareness of online safety amongst parents and wider community interest groups.

HIOWC have carried out numerous public engagement events including:

- Farnborough International Air show CSCV and CCU provided Protect briefings to CEO's and developed a cyber security plan for police attending the event.
- Op Tipper CSCV and CCU carrying out online vulnerability assessments on stalking victims and other high risk individuals in Hampshire.
- Protect Campaigns CSCV conducted numerous front facing campaigns / events in the community – delivering guidance and advice to members of the public who approach them.
- CSCV delivering Protect inputs to Neighbourhood Watch groups throughout Hampshire.

Neighbourhood Watch Upskilling workshops were piloted at the beginning of March 2023. Nationwide Building Society and HSBC delivered 30 minute talks on how banks can see and deal with cases of fraud. HIOWC also delivered a talk on fraud scams currently affecting residents in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight.

The Youth Commission devised the Cyber Ambassador Scheme as cyber safety was one of their priorities and the consultation found that young people had regularly experienced issues online, or knew of friends or family who had.

After a successful consultation with teachers, the Cyber Ambassador Scheme was devised and piloted in 9 primary and 7 secondary schools across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. The pilot ran between September 2017 and September 2018 by the OPCC Communications and Engagement team with help of Youth Commission volunteers.

The scheme has been successfully delivered in 116 primary schools, 54 secondary schools and 2 SEND schools across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight.

The National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) have endorsed/adopted Hampshire OPCC Cyber Ambassadors across the UK. This will continue to be supported by the OPCC. Portsmouth City Digital Partnership has been adopted (Government initiative) and Hampshire OPCC is a part of its implementation.
