1.1 That the Executive Member for Education and Skills, Human Resources and Performance gives approval to the project proposals for the proposed new Chestnut Avenue Primary School at an estimated cost of £6,200,000.

1.2 That the Executive Member for Education and Skills, Human Resources and Performance gives approval to spend and enter into the necessary contractual arrangements to implement the project.

2. Executive Summary

- 2.1 This report seeks approval to the project proposals for the proposed new Chestnut Avenue Primary School, at an estimated total cost of £6,200,000.
- 2.2 The purpose of this report is to seek approval to spend and enter into the necessary contractual arrangements to implement the project.

3. Scope of Work

- 3.1 This project is required to meet the anticipated demand for primary places from the 1,100 new homes on the new North Stoneham Park development in Eastleigh.
- 3.2 It is proposed to provide a new 1.5 fe primary school to cater for a maximum of 315 pupils aged 4-11 years. The new school will be located in the south east of the new housing development.

4. Contextual Information

4.1. In response to the provision of 1,100 new homes, the provision of a new 1.5 fe primary school is proposed to meet the forecast growth in pupil numbers. Should further housing development be proposed, the site can

- accommodate a future 0.5FE expansion (105 places) to 2FE to meet additional demand.
- 4.2. The funding for the project was approved at the Executive Lead Member for Children's Services Decision Day on 15 January 2018 and this report outlines the available budget from within which the project must be designed and delivered.
- 4.3. The proposed new Primary School will be a Free School as required by the Department for Education (DfE) and was established through the Free School 'presumption' route. The County Council proposed the University of Winchester Academy Trust as the Free school sponsor and this has been approved by the DfE.
- 4.4. The school site and the funding for the school are being provided by way of developer's contributions secured via a Section 106 Planning Agreement as part of the planning approval process for the proposed residential development. There is no funding contribution from the County Council. The school building has been designed within DfE Free School benchmark cost parameters and within the available developers contributions.

6. Details of site and existing Infrastructure

- 6.1. The new primary school site is on the North Stoneham Park residential development located off Stoneham Lane, Eastleigh.
- 6.2. The school site is provided at no cost to the County Council under the Section 106 Planning Agreement.
- 6.3. The new school site area is approximately 1.6 hectares and is located to the south east of the development. The site slopes gently from west to east and is bounded by a mature trees and hedges around the east, north and west boundaries. A number of well established oak trees around the perimeter are covered by Tree Preservation Orders (TPO'S)
- 6.4. The school site is located adjacent to the proposed local centre facilities and car parking. This will enable the school to operate at the heart of the

new development and take advantage of parking available adjacent to the building. The site, the incoming services, and the utilities will be provided as part of the new development and have sufficient capacity for future expansion to 2FE on the school site.

7. Scope of the Project

- 7.1. The new Primary School will include:
 - Main hall
 - 11 Classrooms
 - Group rooms
 - Learning Resource Centre/Library
 - Specialist and practical classroom
 - Staffroom and staff workspace
 - Administrative offices
 - Pupil and staff toilets
 - Accessible toilets and a hygiene room
 - Kitchen
 - Other support facilities
- 7.2. It is anticipated that works will commence on site during Spring 2019 and complete during Summer 2020.
- 7.3. It is proposed that the contractor will access the school site by the new access road constructed by the developer. The contractor's compound will be accommodated within the school site.

8. The Proposed Building

- 8.1. In developing the design of the new school consideration has been given to three key principles in response to the site and context:
 - Two storey accommodation to create an economic and compact plan and to allow sufficient site area for future school expansion.
 - A fully accessible school entrance and hall located at the front of the school to be adjacent to the other local community facilities and the adjacent pre-school.
 - Reception and Key stage 1 classrooms on the ground floor adjacent to outdoor teaching areas and external play areas.
- 8.2. It is proposed that the school will be built with a structural frame for ease of construction and future adaptability. The predominant external finish will be traditional brick work with aluminium windows and doors. There will be high performance roofs specified and solar shading is proposed to the south facing classrooms.

9. External Works

9.1. The external landscape proposals at the Primary School will include:

- Soft landscaping including a grass playing field
- Car parking for staff and two accessible spaces
- Habitat area
- Play court and soft play areas
- Specific play areas adjacent to reception classrooms
- 9.2. The project will provide car parking on the school site and meet the requirements of Hampshire County Council On-site School Parking Policy. Provision will be as follows:
 - 28 Parking Bays incl. 2 accessible Bays
 - Space for 1 minibus
 - Space for 1 motor bike (with space to expand if needed)
 - 20 sheltered bike spaces; and
 - Provision for 36 scooters

Sufficient space has been allowed for additional parking bays and cycles to accommodate a future 0.5FE school expansion.

9.3. The school is located within the overall residential development of North Stoneham. It is strategically well connected to the proposed new homes by way of new footpaths and cycle ways through landscaped areas to the wider development and to the car parking areas in the local centre immediately adjacent to the school.

10. Planning

10.1. A planning application was submitted in August 2018.

11. Building Management

11.1 The school will be governed and managed by the University of Winchester Academy Trust upon completion.

1.1. That the Executive Member for Education and Skills, Human Resources and Performance gives approval to the project proposals for the expansion of Four Marks CE Primary School at an estimated total cost of £2,070,000.

1.2. That the Executive Member for Education and Skills, Human Resources and Performance gives approval to spend and enter into the necessary contractual arrangements to implement the project.

2. Executive Summary

- 2.1 This report seeks approval to the project proposals for the permanent expansion of Four Marks CE Primary School, at an estimated total cost of £2,070,000.
- 2.2 The purpose of this report is to seek approval to spend and enter into the necessary contractual arrangements to implement the project.

3. Scope of Work

3.1 It is proposed to construct a new 4 classroom extension to Four Marks CE Primary School to increase the schools capacity from a 1.5 forms of entry to a 2 forms of entry (an increase from 315 to 420 pupils).

4. Contextual Information

- 4.1 Four Marks CE Primary school's net capacity is 315 and there are currently 304 pupils on roll. This project is required to provide 105 additional pupil places at the school principally in response to the new housing developments in the local area.
- 4.2 The funding for the project was approved at the Executive Lead Member for Children's Services Decision Day on 15 January 2018 and this report

outlines the available budget from within which the project must be designed and delivered.

6 Details of site and existing Infrastructure

- 6.1 Four Marks CE Primary School is located off Kitwood Road in Four Marks near to Alton.
- 6.2 The original school building was constructed in 1902 and then significantly extended in 1958. Since then there have been several smaller extensions, the latest being a library in 2015. The buildings are mainly of brick construction with slate pitched roofs.
- 6.3 The school site is approximately 2 hectares. The school playground and playing fields are located to the north of the site and further play areas and grass areas are located to the south. The car park and existing pre-school are located in south west corner.
- 6.4 The existing mains services and drainage infrastructure at the site will be sufficient to accommodate the project proposals.

7 Scope of the Project

- 7.1 The expansion works at Four Marks CE Primary School will include:
 - Four new classrooms
 - Group teaching area
 - Toilet provision for the new classrooms
 - Conversion of 2 existing classrooms into a flexible multi-use studio
- 7.2 The works will commence on site during summer 2019 and complete during spring 2020.

8 The Proposed Building

- 8.1 The proposed four classroom extension encloses a new landscaped courtyard with existing school buildings. The new classrooms will joined to the existing building by a covered link. The scale and roof form of the proposed extension will complement that of the existing school buildings. It is proposed that the new building will be constructed using a cross laminated timber structure with external elevations of brick and timber cladding. Windows and doors will be aluminium and pitched roofs will be finished in slate to complement the existing buildings.
- 8.2 It is proposed that the contractor will access the school site by the existing maintenance access directly on to the playing field from Hawthorn Road with a separate, secure access route and working area to the location of the proposed extension.
- 8.3 No deliveries or movements of vehicles will take place at the start or end of the school day in order to avoid traffic conflict when pupils are arriving at or departing from the school.
- 8.4 The school site will remain in use during the construction period and local management arrangements will be put in place to manage the health and safety impact to all users.

9 External Works

- 9.1 The external landscape proposals will include:
 - A new landscaped courtyard between the proposed and existing buildings which will provide an external learning space for the school:
 - An extension to the existing car park;
 - Additional cycle and scooter parking for pupils;
 - Tree planting and soft landscaping.
- 9.2 The project will provide additional car parking on the school site which will be in line with the Hampshire County Council On-Site School Parking Policy. There will be 5 additional car parking spaces provided for staff, including 1 accessible space, to the existing car park.
- 9.3 The project also includes improvement to and extension of the existing gravel areas to Gradwell Lane to provide additional pupil pick up and drop off.

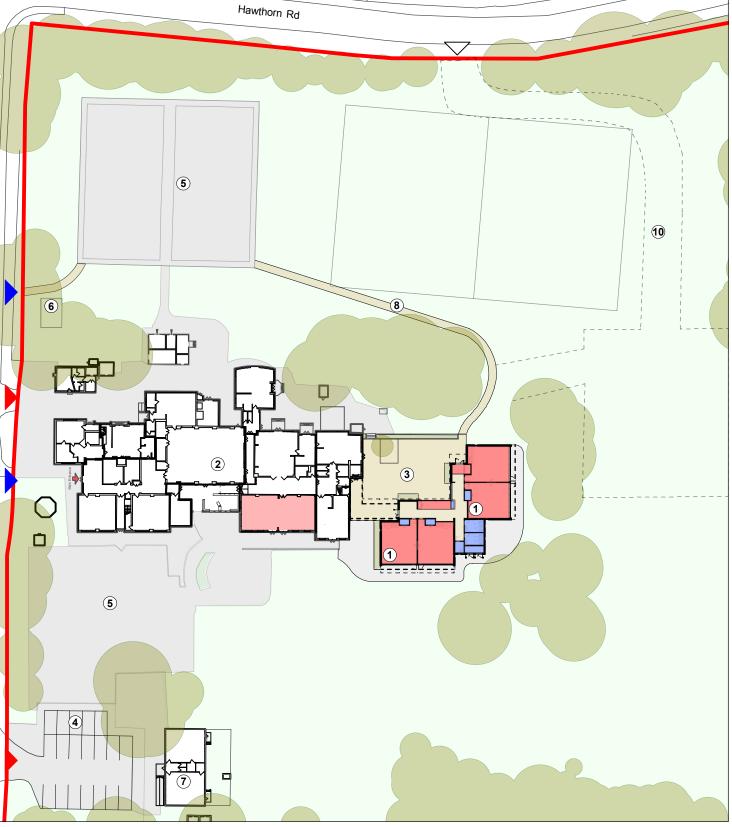




Location Plan



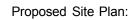

1. Recommendations

1.1. That the Executive Member for Education and Skills, Human Resources and Performance gives approval to the project appraisal for the permanent expansion of Colden Common Primary School at an estimated total cost of £1,800,000.

1.2 That the Executive Member for Education and Skills, Human Resources and Performance gives approval to spend and enter into the necessary contractual arrangements to implement the project.

2. Executive Summary

- 2.1 This report seeks approval to the project proposals for the permanent expansion of Colden Common Primary School in Colden Common, at an estimated total cost of £1,800,000.
- 2.2 The purpose of this report is to seek approval to spend and enter into the necessary contractual arrangements to implement the project.

3. Scope of Work

3.1 It is proposed that Colden Common Primary be extended to permanently increase the School's capacity from 1.5 forms of entry to 2 forms of entry.

4. Contextual Information

- 4.1 Colden Common Primary school's net capacity is 420 of which 90 places are currently provided in temporary accommodation. This project will replace the temporary accommodation and provide the required 90 places in a permanent extension. There are currently 356 pupils on roll. The extension will enable the school to grow to its full capacity in response to new housing developments in the local area.
- 4.2 The funding for the project was approved at the Executive Lead Member for Children's Services Decision Day on 15 January 2018 and this report

outlines the indicative available budget from which the project must be designed and delivered.

6. Details of site and existing Infrastructure

- 6.1 Colden Common Primary School is located on Upper Moors Road, Brambridge, in Colden Common. It is situated in the heart of the village and bounded by residential developments to the east and south.
- 6.2 The school was re-built in 1997 following a fire which destroyed the original school building and two classrooms were added in 2015.
- 6.3 There are currently three temporary classrooms on site to accommodate growth in pupil numbers and by September 2019 it is expected that all three units will be full. On the completion of this permanent expansion project these temporary classrooms will be removed.
- 6.4 The school site is approximately 2.3 hectares, including an amount of reclaimed land. The school playing field is located to the east of the site and there are playgrounds to the north and south of the school building. The northern boundary comprises a wooded habitat area. The school car park is located on the west frontage to Upper Moors Road.
- 6.5 The existing mains services have been assessed and allowance has been made for the incoming electrical main to be upgraded to cater for the additional demand.
- 6.6 No permanent alterations to the main vehicular entrance to the school will be made as a result of the proposals.

7 Scope of the Project

- 7.1 The works to replace the temporary classrooms at Colden Common Primary School will include:
 - A new single storey three classroom extension
 - 4 No pupil toilets
 - An additional plantroom

- Alterations and additional equipment within the existing kitchen to increase ventilation and meet the demand of increased pupil numbers.
- 7.2 It is anticipated that works will commence on site during Autumn 2019 and complete during Summer 2020.

8 The Proposed Building

- 8.1 The proposed three classroom extension is located at the east end of the existing main classroom wing. It has been designed with a pitched aluminium roof to complement the scale and form of the existing school building. The building will be constructed using a steel frame with elevations of external brick work and aluminium windows and doors.
- 8.2 It is proposed that the contractor will access the school site by the main school entrance off Upper Moors Road. The contractor's compound will be adjacent to the proposed new extension accessed via a temporary haul road from the main car park.
- 8.3 No deliveries or movements of vehicles will take place at the start or end of the school day, in order to avoid traffic conflict when pupils are arriving at or departing from the school
- 8.4 The school site will remain in use during the construction period and local management arrangements will be put in place to manage the health and safety impact to all users.

9 External Works

- 9.1 The external landscape proposals will include:
 - External teaching space to the east front of the new classroom extension.
 - Additional cycle and scooter parking for pupils.
- 9.2 The project will provide additional car parking on the school site which will be in line with the Hampshire County Council On-Site School Parking. There will be 5 additional car parking spaces provided for staff including 1 accessible space.

10 Planning

10.1 A planning application is to be submitted in November 2018.

11 Building Management

11.1 The existing building management arrangements will remain in place.

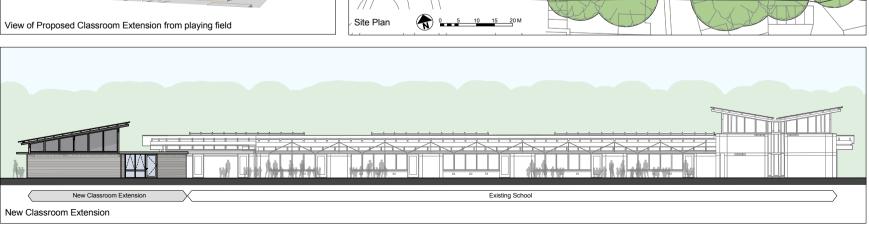

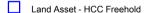
