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## **Purpose of this Report**

1. The report considers two applications for grants from the Leader's Community Grant Fund, one application from the Parish Town Council Investment Fund (PTCIF) and one application from the Rural Community Fund (RCF) for 2023/24.

#### Recommendation

- 2. That the Leader and Executive Member for Hampshire 2050 and Corporate Services approves:
  - a) Two grants totalling £18,900 from the Leader's Community Grant Fund 2023/24 to cultural and community organisations in Hampshire, as set out in Appendix 1.
  - b) One grant totalling £5,278 from the Parish and Town Council Investment Fund, as set out in Appendix 2.
  - c) One grant totalling £5,000 from the Rural Community Fund, as set out in Appendix 3.

### **Executive Summary**

- 3. Two organisations have applied for a grant through the Leader's Community Grant Fund totalling £40,176, one organisation has applied for a grant from the Parish Town Council Investment Fund (PTCIF) totalling £5,278 and one organisation has applied for a grant from the Rural Community Fund (RCF) totalling £5,000, for 2023/24.
- 4. The report considers the applications and recommends the awards totalling £18,900 from the Leader's Community Grant Fund, £5,278 from the Parish Town Council Investment Fund (PTCIF) and £5,000 from the Rural Community Fund (RCF). The recommended awards can be met from within existing budget provision.

5. Appendix 4 summarises Officer Decisions made since the last Decision Day.

#### **Contextual Information**

- 6. The purpose of the Leader's Community Grant Fund is to fund projects which provide community benefit and help local communities thrive and/or to help local organisations become financially self-supporting and not reliant on public sector funding.
- 7. The priority of the PTCIF is to support partnerships between Parish and Town Councils or local community groups and the County Council. It provides investments to schemes which respond to local needs and aims to reduce pressure on County Council Services.
- 8. The Rural Communities Fund offers small grants to support Parish Councils, groups and organisations in rural Hampshire and small market towns. The overall priorities of the scheme are to build community resilience and encourage self-help.

- 10. Grant applications received since the last Decision Day on 22 January 2024 for awards below £5,000 and/or any minor administrative changes to grants previously awarded, have been approved by the Corporate Director for Hampshire 2050, in consultation with the Leader and Executive Member for Hampshire 2050 and Corporate Services. These are summarised in Appendix 4 for information.

#### **Finance**

11. The recommended awards can be met from within existing budget provision.

- 12. A high-level Equalities Impact Assessment has been undertaken. The grants are intended to have a positive impact and advance equality.
- 13. The corporate terms and condition of grant require that any organisation in receipt of funding shall ensure that at all times it complies with the Equality Act 2010 if applicable and shall ensure that it does not discriminate against any person or persons on the basis of protected characteristics.

## **Climate Change Impact Assessment**

14. Hampshire County Council utilises two decision-making tools to assess the carbon emissions and resilience of its projects and decisions. These tools provide a clear, robust, and transparent way of assessing how projects, policies and initiatives contribute towards the County Council's climate change targets of being carbon neutral and resilient to the impacts of a 2°C temperature rise by 2050. This process ensures that climate change considerations are built into everything the Authority does.

15. The carbon mitigation tool decision tree indicates it is not suitable for the assessment of a programme. The decisions in this report are financial decisions in relation to a programme of one-off grant opportunities. Therefore, the tool is not suitable for this Climate Change Impact Assessment and has not been used.

## Other Key Issues

16. Legal Implications: Section 1 (1) of the Localism Act gives the County Council the power to do anything that individuals may generally do. This includes the power to make grants.

	The Diving Museum is owned and managed by the Historical Diving Society, with the principal aim of preserving the history of diving. It is housed in No. 2 Battery, a Grade II* listed building built in the 1860s primarily to defend against a sea-borne attack. The building is on the 'Heritage at Risk' register and has significant damp issues, restricting use to one-third of the building. A major aim since the Museum opened has been to improve the internal environment for the storage and display of the collection and provide better access for the public. Grants from Arts Council England and Historic England have been awarded to open the remaining two-thirds of No.2 Battery, ensuring that the museum is accessible and usable. Works include installing an air source heat pump to help manage humidity and water ingress, installing a ventilation system to control air movement within the building and repairing holes. In addition, work will include restoring and conserving historic features throughout the building, such as the nuclear blast doors from the period the building was GBC's Cold War nuclear bunker and install an external ramp at the entrance to the building and an internal platform lift, internal ramps to accommodate changes in floor levels and create an accessible emergency exit at the rear. Once completed, it will enable the Museum to move forward to Phase 2, which will include submitting a bid to the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Application summary	2025 marks Jane Austen's 250th Birthday at Chawton House. In the run up to this momentous year and building on the successful trials of outside events at Chawton House during Covid, they are planning to create and embed an annual calendar of community-focused events, activities, creative and garden workshops, so Chawton House is a place for local people to me volunteer and try something new. Their Business Plan indicates this build-up will result in them being self-sufficient and non-reliant on grant funds from 2025 onwards.  They wish to create a place for the community to come together, either as individuals, or in groups. 'In reimagining Chawton House as a community-focused historic house and estate, championing historic and contemporary women's writing and encouraging creative practice, we will engage audiences of all ages and backgrounds in the cultural and natural history of this place, whilst overseeing heritage and nature restoration of the whole site.'  The recommended grant award focusses on the additional external costs of hosting their planned calendar of events, and recognises the substantial contribution being made from their own funds, and their dedicated volunteers, providing the best opportunity for long-term sustainability, and further building on the increased visitor numbers seen in recent years. Application summary		Compton & Shawford Parish Council own the parish hall in Shawford. The venue is incredibly popular and serves a wide variety of clubs and groups within the community.						
	Following recent increases in energy bills, electricity costs have increased from 27p/kW to 58p/kW, resulting in an annual electricity cost of £10,945. They are seeking to reduce these costs, whilst at the same time contributing to a more energy efficient facility. They are applying for funding to install energy efficient LED lighting throughout the building and improve the roof insulation. The improvements are projected to support a reduction in energy consumption from 18,870 kW/hr to 9,980 kW/hr annually, equalling a £4,944 reduction in energy bills. Their annual energy bills are still £1,800 more than they were prior to energy price rises. Compton & Shawford Parish Council can make £1000 available to support this project, if required. With support from the Climate Change Programme Team, this application is recommended for £5,278 funding.  Climate Change Programme Team comments: Hampshire County Council is striving to tackle climate change through two targets, to be carbon neutral by 2050 and resilient to a two-degree warming.
