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1. Recommendations

- 1.1. That SACRE notes the report
- 1.2. That the Chairman writes to the Executive Member for Education and the Director of Children's Services recommending that schools have a link governor for religious education.
- 1.3. That the Chairman writes to head teachers reminding them of the need for schools to have clear information on their websites about their religious education curriculum, as well as how children's spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is promoted.

2. Summary

- 2.1. The purpose of this report is to inform SACRE of the findings and discussions of the SACRE monitoring group meeting on 14 May 2018.
- 2.2. The group was updated on the current situation regarding the implementation of Living Difference III (LDIII) including head teacher briefings and other continuing professional education opportunities for teachers. To enable SACRE to monitor the effectiveness of LDIII, reports from primary and secondary visits to schools from Ofsted referring to RE, British Values or SMSC that had taken place since our last meeting were considered. In addition to this information gathered from SACRE Monitoring and other HIAS visits to schools was also discussed. An update on initial teacher education and current RE staffing was received and considered.

3. Contextual information

- 3.1. This paper supports the Corporate Strategy (maximising well being) by ensuring children's provision in Religious Education is secure.
- 3.2. The monitoring sub-group met on Monday 14 May 2018 at The Hampshire RE Curriculum Centre.

4. Other key issues

- 4.1. The implementation and now on-going monitoring of the effectiveness of Hampshire agreed syllabus, Living Difference III (LDIII) was discussed. SACRE Officers continue to run regional network meetings for primary and secondary teachers. For 2018/19 some primary twilight meetings are also being offered for any schools facing budgetary restrictions.
- 4.2. There was discussion about the importance of there being an identifiable governor with specific interest in religious education and for schools ensuring that the religious education curriculum is clearly visible on the school's website.
- 4.3. SACRE primary adviser continues to assist the Diocese in advising schools' on best practice regarding the use of the resource Understanding Christianity (UC) with LDIII.
- 4.4. Following the successful collaboration between HIAS and Brunel University London, in October 2017 a further project is being developed researching into 'Religious literacy'. This project has also been funded by Culham st Gabriel's Trust, and will involve the appointment of a post doctoral researcher at Brunel as well as an academic 'summit' in October. In November there will be a meeting with Hampshire teachers and other researchers to follow up the findings of the research. This is an excellent opportunity for Hampshire RE teachers to be involved in the dissemination of cutting edge research.
- 4.5. Since the last Monitoring Group meeting nine secondary schools had received an

Ofsted Inspection visit in some form. A summary of a number of primary Ofsted reports was also discussed. The secondary reports sometimes reveal that inspectors are not fully briefed about religious education.

4.6. Recruitment is going better than this time last year for the Secondary PGCE course at Winchester University.

5. SACRE 3 Year Action Plan

5.1. As requested by the March SACRE meeting the monitoring group meeting reviewed the SACRE 3 year Action Plan which is presented to SACRE for consideration and agreement under a separate agenda item.

- 2.3. The above is intended to reduce hate crime especially in relation to religious hate crime as well as contributing to preventing children and young people being drawn into extremist positions in relation to religion

3. Climate Change:

- a) How does what is being proposed impact on our carbon footprint / energy consumption?
- 3.1 It is intended that good quality religious education, taught in accordance with the Hampshire Agreed Syllabus *Living Difference III*, will contribute to the emergence of more thoughtful and reflective young people into the world. We hope they will be better able to consider their impact on the world and discern how to live their lives so as not to do harm to themselves and their communities.
