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

The tipping point – Funding consequences



Local funding and further efficiency cannot meet the funding shortfall, Hampshire Constabulary faces by 2021. Without an increase in national funding, the risk to the public will exceed acceptable levels.

Hampshire Constabulary is a very low cost force for its size and complexity of demand, receiving **£43.5m** less than average.


