86. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Members were mindful that where they believed they had a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in any matter considered at the meeting they must declare that interest at the time of the relevant debate and, having regard to the circumstances described in Part 3, Paragraph 1.5 of the County Council's Members' Code of Conduct, leave the meeting while the matter was discussed, save for exercising any right to speak in accordance with Paragraph 1.6 of the Code. Furthermore Members were mindful that where they believed they had a Personal interest in a matter being considered at the meeting they considered whether such interest should be declared, and having regard to Part 5, Paragraph 5 of the Code, considered whether it was appropriate to leave the meeting whilst the matter was discussed, save for exercising any right to speak in accordance with the Code.

88. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

The minutes of the last meeting held on 15 June 2023 were reviewed and agreed.

89. DEPUTATIONS

No Deputations were received.

90. CHAIRMAN'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Chairman Dr Matt Nisbet welcomed all present to the meeting, which was to be followed by the Hampshire Place Assembly.

The Chairman informed the Board that the Hampshire Place Board continued to focus on discharge provision and prevention and mental health. A summary regarding the Place Board would be circulated to Members in the coming weeks.

Following the Hampshire Place Assembly in June, which focused upon social isolation, loneliness, and social connection, Members received a short update on actions following the Place Assembly.

The Chairman encouraged everyone eligible this year to come forward for their Covid and flu vaccine.

91. CLIMATE CHANGE AND HEALTH

The Board received a report and presentation setting out the impact of climate change on the population and identified the synergies between the public health's and action on climate change. The Chairman welcomed Sian Davies, Penny Brown, Lyndsay Jones and Chitra Nadarajah.

The speakers represented the principal tiers of local government and the NHS and highlighted the plans and actions being undertaken across the county, based on a Mitigate, Adapt and Impact approach. An overview of the consequences of global warming was given and the equity implications were highlighted, including seldom heard and young people.

There was also discussion regarding climate change, in particular about actions to address climate change consequences within the estate, it was noted that The County Council is working with the University of Southampton studying residential care homes including means to adapt – the work is due to complete in February 2024.

RESOLVED

That the Health and Wellbeing Board:

1. Recognise the implications of climate change on health and the opportunities for improving health whilst reducing carbon emissions.
2. To note the highlighted constituent organisations priorities and actions on climate change and for all organisations to consider their role in climate change mitigation and adaptation.
3. Ensure climate change adaptation and mitigation measures consider impacts on health inequalities.

4. That Board members seek opportunities to collaborate on measures to mitigate and adapt to climate change, with a focus on health inequalities.

92. **PHYSICAL ACTIVITY STRATEGY UPDATE**

The Board received a report and presentation from Energise Me and the Chairman welcomed CEO Julie Amies to present the report.

The Board were reminded that the 'We Can Be Active' system strategy had been adopted in October 2021, that it had been based on a public engagement and was built around five broad goals. A new government strategy, Get Active, had been launched in September 2023.

Members heard the updates on progress made based on the goals within the strategy and recognised the activity that is happening across Hampshire to promote, enable, offer choice and ensure accessibility with regards to physical activity.

There was also discussion surrounding supporting the #BeeWell survey which is aimed at secondary school aged children to gather data about their views on physical activity which will support future organisational learning. Suzanne Smith agreed to take forward the suggestion around reaching out to school governors for support for engaging with physical activities.

RESOLVED:

That the Health and Wellbeing Board support, encourage and promote the aims of the 'We Can Be Active Strategy' including tackling inequalities with regards to inactivity and recognise the co-benefits of physical activity for social isolation, mental wellbeing, and climate change promoting activity in all aspect of organisation's remit. This encompassed the specific recommendations in the report.

93. **PUBLIC HEALTH STRATEGY UPDATE**

The Board received a presentation on the Public Health Strategy from Simon Bryant, Director of Public Health. Jo Jefferies, Associate Director of Public Health introduced the Public Health Strategy 2023-26, which was set out in full.

The following principal points were highlighted:

- The strategy had been based on the Hampshire Joint Strategic Needs Assessment and engagement with key system stakeholders.
- HCC had a statutory duty to improve health and well-being and reduce inequalities.
- The ambitions were to increase the number of years residents could expect to live in good health and reduce the gap in healthy life years between the most and least healthy.
 - It addressed the building blocks of health and sought to shape a place where it is easier for people to be healthy – health people, healthy people, healthy lives.

- The role of “anchor” organisations supporting the strategy were noted alongside the new strategies alignment with system partners strategies.

RESOLVED

1. The Health & Well-Being Board review and support the strategies launch
2. Support to embed the strategy and engage with the action plans linked to the strategic themes and ambitions

Purpose of this Report

1. This report provides an update on the progress made by the integrated care systems serving Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, which are the Frimley and Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care Systems.
2. The report outlines the agreed strategic priorities and provides a summary of the progress made in the delivery of the strategies.
3. The report sets out the ambitions and next steps for the integrated care systems.

Recommendation(s)

That the Hampshire Health and Wellbeing Board:

4. Receive the report and note the progress made and delivering the strategic priorities.
5. Consider its role in helping to deliver the strategic priorities across both integrated care systems.

Executive Summary

6. Hampshire County Council is part of both the Hampshire and Isle of Wight and Frimley Integrated Care Systems, which were established in July 2022 as part of the new Health and Social Care Act 2022. Both systems are composed of two new statutory health and care components, an integrated care board and an integrated care partnership.
7. The integrated care partnerships bring together a broad range of partners from across different sectors and are responsible for setting the strategy for health and care to meet local healthcare, social care and public health needs.
8. The integrated care strategies describe the priorities across each system. These priorities build on the work of the Local Health and Wellbeing Boards and set priorities where collaboration and joint working would have a positive impact.
9. This report outlines the progress made following the report to the Hampshire Health and Wellbeing Board in March 2023.

Key priorities for each Strategy

Strategic Ambitions

10. Each partnership has set some key strategic ambitions which aim to promote the health and wellbeing of the population of Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. Though the priorities are different, to reflect the local needs, there are common threads concerning a focus on prevention, tackling health inequalities, improving health outcomes and service delivery.
11. The Frimley Health and Care Integrated Care System has two flagship ambitions, which are: to reduce health inequalities and to increase healthy life expectancy. In addition, it has six strategic ambitions which are:
 - Starting well
 - Living well
 - People, places and communities
 - Our people
 - Leadership and cultures
 - Outstanding use of resources

12. The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care Partnership has set out its aims which are to:
 - Reduce the demand for health and care services.
 - Enable us to further improve the quality of service we provide.
 - Relieve pressure on the people who work in our organisations.
 - Enable us to live within our financial means.
13. Five priority areas emerged from initial assessment of data and understanding insights from people, communities, and colleagues:
 - Children and Young people
 - Mental Wellbeing
 - Good health and proactive care
 - Our People (Workforce)
 - Digital solutions, data, and insight

Achievements and Next Steps

14. Both integrated care partnerships have worked with a range of stakeholders to develop their priorities and to benefit from collaboration and joint working. The strategies also draw upon the Hampshire Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) to identify the population's health and wellbeing needs and health inequalities.
15. The Frimley Integrated Care System has established an assembly, consisting of a range of partner organisations from statutory and the voluntary, community and social enterprise sectors. A refreshed strategy has been published and a local forward plan will be published setting out how the ambitions of the strategy will be achieved. In addition, there has been an emphasis on developing system leadership and the culture of the partnership. As next steps, the Frimley Integrated Care Partnership will be developing the design and function of the Partnership. In addition, there will be a focus on ensuring the progress and impact of the strategy is measured and reported. There will also work to continue to strengthen and embed partnership working.
16. The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care System has established a system of assemblies, involving a wide range of stakeholders, the last of which was held in September around the theme of mental wellbeing, and a joint committee of key stakeholders. Programme boards and leads have been identified for the strategic priorities and work has mobilised. The Hampshire and Isle of Wight VCSE Health and Care Alliance (HIVCA) is also being developed to strengthen the voice of the voluntary sector. As next steps, the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care Partnership will be focussing on

the delivery of the programmes and having effective, agreed outcomes measures. There will also be a focus on the opportunities for shared communications. An assembly with the theme of social connectedness will be held in February 2024.

17. The Integrated Care Partnerships will have regard for and build on the work of the health and wellbeing boards to maximise the value of place based collaboration and integration and reduce the risk of duplication. They will ensure that action at system-wide level adds value to the action at place and they are all aligned in understanding what is best for the population.

Conclusion

18. The Frimley and Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care Systems are working with a broad range of stakeholders to develop strategic priorities where there are benefits in greater partnership working and use of the collective resources to improve the health of the population.
19. The strategies that have been developed with the aim of supporting people to live healthy lives, tackling health inequalities, with an emphasis on preventative interventions, and to reduce the need for health and care services in the long term.
20. The strategies acknowledge the work happening at a Hampshire place level and importance of partnership working with the Hampshire Health and Wellbeing Board. It is recognised that health and wellbeing boards lead action at place level to improve people's lives and remain responsible for promoting greater integration and partnership between the NHS, public health, and local government. Both Integrated Care Systems seek to work alongside the Hampshire Health and Wellbeing Board to maximise opportunities for joint working to improve the health outcomes of the Hampshire and Isle of Wight population.

What is an Integrated Care System?

NHS England defines an integrated care system as “**partnerships of organisations that come together to plan and deliver joined up health and care services, and to improve the lives of people who live and work in their area**” ([NHS England » What are integrated care systems?](#)). The Health and Care Act 2022 established **42 Integrated Care Systems** across England.

- Each Integrated Care System contains two statutory elements:
 - the **Integrated Care Partnership**, responsible for setting our integrated care strategy; and
 - an **Integrated Care Board**, responsible for a number of functions around healthcare service delivery including planning, resource allocation, quality and transformation.
- The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care System is made up of four places: Hampshire, Southampton, Portsmouth and Isle of Wight, each of which has a Health and Wellbeing Board and a partnership board.
- Frimley Integrated Care System is made up of five places: North East Hampshire and Farnham, the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead, Bracknell, Slough and Surrey Health.
- All system partners with the Integrated Care System have a key role in setting the conditions for the system to thrive and succeed, for the benefit of all the people living within the area served by the Integrated Care System.

Though Hampshire is served by two Integrated Care Systems, the priorities and approaches are similar in their aim of benefitting the health and wellbeing of people living in Hampshire.

Our Approach

Frimley Health and Care Partnership

In the Frimley Health and Care Integrated Care System we have:

- Page 16
- Co-designed with partners an “assembly” approach to the formation and delivery of the Integrated Care Partnership
 - Prioritised the effectiveness of our joint work and relationships with the three Public Health functions in the Frimley geography
 - Held focused leadership development time to consider and develop the Frimley leadership vision and values
 - Committed to the importance of the Health and Wellbeing Board construct, of which there are five in the Frimley geography, including placing health intelligence (i.e. JSNAs) at the heart of our approach

Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care System

- The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care Partnership has developed a vision: “Happier, safer, healthier. Together.”
- The joint committee sets the strategic focus for the Integrated Care System, ensuring the Integrated Care System adds value to place, modelling system behaviours and developing and a learning and sharing culture and maximising the collective use of resources to enable the delivery of the strategy
- The joint committee acts as the steering committee for the Integrated Care Partnership and sets the strategic direction for the system
- The assembly is a forum for bringing together all the different partners across the system to creatively problem solve some of the challenges of working together
- The partnership has also developed a set of ambitions, outcomes and strategic actions which fall under each of the priority areas
- An Integrated Care Partnership Steering Group meets monthly to ensure joint planning and avoid duplication



What has been achieved?

Frimley Health and Care Partnership

Since July 2022 we have:

- Established the Integrated Care Partnership, an Assembly of c.85 attendees from a broad range of statutory and VCSE partners across the Frimley geography
- Published our refreshed strategy, *Creating Healthier Communities* which sets out our shared objectives and strategic ambitions
- Held focused leadership development time to consider and develop the Frimley leadership vision and values
- Created a mandate for the local NHS to publish a *Joint Forward Plan* which makes clear how some of this work will be progressed

Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care System

- Three assemblies have been held, the last one held in September focused on mental wellbeing with over 100 people attending
- Programme boards have been established and strategic leads identified
- Work has already mobilised (e.g. joint work to promote the suicide prevention training across partners which resulted in a significant uptake of the training)
- The development of the voluntary sector voice Hampshire and Isle of Wight VCSE Health and Care Alliance (HIVCA) has progressed with appointments made to the leadership committee



Next Steps

Frimley Health and Care Partnership

Our next steps include:

- Working on the design and function of the “ICP 2.0” to be co-developed in partnership with Directors of Public Health, broader local authority partners and the Integrated Care Board working together
- Ensuring we have clarity on measuring delivery progress with our *Creating Healthier Communities* strategy
- Forward planning an exciting programme of sessions for 2024 which places our founding motto – *Learn, Deliberate, Decide* – at the core of our approach to partnership working

Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care System

- The outcomes measures for each priority will be co-designed and confirmed by the New Year
- The Integrated Care Partnership will collaborate on communicating a clear message to Hampshire and Isle of Wight residents about keeping well this winter
- An assembly focussing on the social connectedness strategic priority will be held in February 2024
- HIVCA will develop a memorandum of understanding which will be submitted to the joint committee in the New Year
- The programmes will provide an update on their activities and outcomes at the joint committee in March 2024

Purpose of this Report

1. This report seeks to update the Health and Wellbeing Board on the Healthy Weight Strategy for Hampshire, providing examples of the successes achieved by system partners in contributing to the strategy and makes recommendations on how to progress with the ambition to mitigate against the prevalence of obesity in Hampshire and support Hampshire residents who are overweight or obese.

Recommendation(s)

That the Hampshire Health and Wellbeing Board:

2. Recognise the ongoing impacts on the health of Hampshire residents of being overweight or obese.
3. To note progress made by system partners in delivering core objectives of the Healthy Weight Strategy.
4. Seek opportunities to collaborate on measures to mitigate excess weight gain among Hampshire residents and support those residents who are living with obesity.
5. Recognise the opportunities for Districts and Borough Councils to apply good practice identified in taking a whole systems approach building and linking healthy weight objectives into various policies.

Executive Summary

6. The prevalence of overweight & obesity in Hampshire is slightly higher than the regional prevalence and the same as the national prevalence. This highlights the need for ongoing action among partners to tackle this important public health problem.
7. Partners from Local Authorities, Integrated Care Boards, to Childrens Partnerships and Public Health continue to work with ambition to mitigate weight gain and help those living with obesity to manage their weight. The Hampshire healthy weight strategy exists to support this ambition.
8. This report makes recommendations on how to proceed with the Healthy Weight Strategy with the ultimate objective of reducing the prevalence of overweight and obesity in Hampshire and reducing it's impact on population health.

Contextual Information

9. It is estimated that the current percentage of adults in England (aged 18+) affected by overweight or obesity is 63.8% (2021/22)¹. Although there are people in all population groups who are above a healthy weight, obesity is related to social disadvantage with some population groups are more affected than others. For example, the prevalence of excess weight 11% higher in the most deprived compared to the least deprived areas².
10. Being overweight or obesity can lead to chronic and severe medical conditions³. The urgency of addressing excess weight in the population was highlighted during the COVID-19 pandemic. Living with excess weight put people at greater risk of serious illness or death from COVID-19, with risk growing as body mass index (BMI) increases.
11. A national policy paper was published in July 2020, announcing a set of new policies to empower people to make healthier choices. This paper established that “helping people to achieve and maintain a healthy weight is one of the most important things we can do to improve our nation’s health”⁴.

12. In Hampshire, the percentage of adults estimate to be living with overweight or obesity is 63.2%, which is similar to England at 63.5% and slightly higher than the regional average of 62.4%⁵.

Hampshire Healthy Weight Strategy

13. The Hampshire Healthy Weight Strategy 2022-2026 supports the overarching [Public Health Strategy for Hampshire](#) in its ambition to increase the number of years Hampshire residents can expect to live in good health and reduce the gap in healthy life years between the most and least healthy.
14. Through effective partnership working to deliver cross-cutting actions and using a whole systems approach, the Hampshire Healthy Weight Strategy 2022-2026 aims to reduce or level off the prevalence of overweight and obesity.
15. While the Hampshire Healthy Weight Strategy 2022-2026 remains a key document of reference focussing on overweight and obesity in Hampshire, there are obvious synergies with allied [strategy and policy documents](#), including the Hampshire Physical Activity Strategy, the draft Local Transport Plan (LTP4), and the District and Borough Local Plans.
16. Through our three overarching strategic objectives we will work towards a healthier Hampshire:
- a. We will support places and communities to enable residents to achieve a healthier weight.
 - b. We will work with health, care, education and community settings and systems to promote healthier weight across the life course.
 - c. We will reduce inequalities in health by focusing on people and populations most at risk.

Action on objective 1: We will support places and communities to enable residents to achieve a healthier weight

17. Partners are working together to ensure that health and wellbeing is enhanced with action on active travel, opportunities for physical activity, access to green and blue space, food environment and encouraging quality food businesses.

18. District and Borough Councils have built health into Local Plans so that future developments can provide opportunities to develop healthy weight urban environments.
19. The draft Local Transport Plan (LTP4) put health and wellbeing at the heart of transport policy, including promoting quality places for people to live and putting measures in place to enable active travel choices.
20. Partners continue to work together to deliver whole systems approaches (WSA) to obesity in Havant and Rushmoor. Work is underway to identify and deliver renewed actions for and with partners.
21. To make progress on healthier food environments, in 2024 a Hampshire-wide healthier food award will be launched for food premises such as caterers, restaurants and take-aways, to apply for (at no cost to the food business).
22. Partners continue to work together to support those Hampshire residents experiencing food insecurity, working with food banks, food pantries, library services and others to improve access, availability, affordability, and quality of healthier food options.

Action on objective 2: We will work with health, care, education and community settings and systems to promote healthier weight across the life course.

- Hampshire County Council (Public Health, Childrens Services and participating schools) actively promote a whole setting approach to healthy weight in educational settings.
 - This includes the provision of lessons in living healthily, provision of a nutritious and varied menu at mealtimes with free school meals for some eligible children, environments in school settings that promote physical activity and opportunities for families to build active travel into their daily routine to/from school.
23. This allows all children to experience and develop positive beliefs and behaviours about eating and exercise that last into adulthood. Support includes training for all staff, resources, and policy guidance.
 24. The Holiday Activity and Food (HAF) programme provides funded holiday activities for children who are in receipt of free school meals. HAF schemes provide healthy meals, and many of these community-based providers carry out the Daily Mile at their provisions, others are specialist sports providers offering a range of sporting activities.

25. Programmes such as the Golden Mile and the Hampshire School Games delivered by Energise Me in partnership with other organisations are key, alongside the great work of our teachers leading PE lessons. Funding has also been achieved to boost physical activity in our communities particularly for those populations who are most inactive.
26. The first 1001 days is recognised as crucial in the best start for children. Hampshire County Council has with stakeholders and the community to [review](#) the support for the first 1001 days of a child's life.
27. Partners are working together to design and test a family lifestyle support programme that sensitively supports factors affecting family members weight. This is to be driven by insights from the very communities partners are trying to support.
28. Childrens Services have successfully increased e-learning uptake among staff on healthier eating in educational settings.

Action on objective 3: We will reduce inequalities in health by focusing on people and populations most at risk.

29. The newly commissioned Tier 2 adult weight management service is focussed on addressing inequalities with priorities including men, residents living in deciles of greater deprivation and those living with comorbidities. Face to face, digital and physical activity formats ensure greater accessibility to the service. Demand for the service has been high.
30. Man V Fat is a physical activity and weight management intervention tailored to the needs of men. Informal football and weight loss achievements equate to points in a league, motivating men to lose weight. There are currently leagues in Aldershot, Andover, Basingstoke, Eastleigh, Gosport, and Havant, reflecting target area where the prevalence of obesity is higher.
31. Public Health, commercial partners and the community are working together to pilot support for women too: working with Horizon Leisure to deliver a women-only programme in Havant and with My Health Revolution to deliver a women-only programme in Gosport and Rushmoor.
32. General practices and community pharmacies can also refer eligible Hampshire residents to the NHS digital weight management programme.

This programme supports Hampshire adults living with obesity who also have a diagnosis of diabetes, hypertension or both, to manage their weight and improve their health. It is a 12-week online behavioural and lifestyle programme that people can access via a smartphone or computer. The ICB are reviewing the current uptake of this service to increase referrals into the programme.

33. NHS commissioned Tier 3 and Tier 4 (bariatric) weight management interventions continue to support residents with higher needs. The impact of recent NICE guidelines on Semaglutide for weight loss on services is not clear at the time of writing.
34. We recognise inequalities in access to weight management support for Hampshire residents living with a Learning Disability (LD). Partners are working together to build on the good practice of other Local Authority weight management programmes to support this specific community.
35. We recognise that mental health may present a barrier to uptake or affect the impact of a standard weight management support offer. Partners are working together to identify accessible support with appropriate outcome expectations.

Conclusion

36. Much work has been undertaken by system partners in seeking to mitigate the opportunities for weight gain and to help those living with obesity in Hampshire. It remains that the work needs to continue, building on the learning derived from the many partners that contribute to mitigating obesity impact in Hampshire.

Purpose of this Report

1. The purpose of this report is to present the Director of Public Health’s Health Protection Annual Report, ahead of publication. It describes the work to protect the health of the people of Hampshire and the future focus of health protection activities in the year to come.

Recommendation(s)

That the Hampshire Health and Wellbeing Board:

2. Notes and agrees the 2022-2023 Health Protection Annual Report of the Director of Public Health.
3. Supports the future focus of health protection activities for 2023-2024.

Executive Summary

4. This is the second health protection annual report produced by Hampshire County Council’s Public Health team covering the period from April 2022 through to March 2023, with a forward look on planned activities for the following year.
5. The Health Protection Board (HPB), led by the Director of Public Health, has provided a forum for oversight and assurance on health protection matters across the Hampshire and Isle of Wight geographies. It has enabled discussion on priority areas identified in the previous annual report and continues to be

the route by which partners across the health protection system can collectively address health protection issues and incidents.

6. This year's report reflects a period of transition and renewed direction, as we safely exit the COVID-19 pandemic. Work by the Council's Public Health team during 2022 and early 2023 can be broadly summarised across three areas:
 - Living with COVID-19
 - Responding to other emerging health protection issues
 - Renewing focus on vaccination, helping shape the National Vaccination Strategy
7. The above three areas of activity were underpinned by a communications strategy designed to address inequalities in the uptake of health protection behaviours, with a specific focus on vaccination.
8. Looking ahead to a future where COVID-19 is no longer considered a Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC¹), the Public Health team will continue to focus on supporting system recovery and responding to emerging health threats. Some of this work will be facilitated through the Contain Outbreak Management Fund (COMF)² to help address health impacts and inequalities which have arisen as a result of the pandemic.

Contextual Information

9. Hampshire County Council (HCC) has a critical role in protecting the health of its population, both in terms of planning to prevent threats from arising, and in ensuring appropriate responses when things do go wrong.
10. The 2012 Health and Social Care Act placed a statutory duty on local authorities to improve and protect the health of their residents.
11. This duty to deliver the health protection function is fulfilled by the Council's Public Health team, who provide 'information and advice' to ensure that threats to health are understood and seek assurance that these threats are properly addressed.

12. The Council's health protection team works with the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA), the NHS, and District and Borough Council Environmental Health teams as part of the local health protection system.

Performance - Health protection activities in 2022 – 2023

13. Living with COVID-19:

- 13.1. Embedding the UK Government's 'Living with COVID-19' strategy in day-to-day functions to manage the virus and support health protection system recovery was a key piece of work. The Council's Public Health team:

- Supported COVID-19 outbreak management.
- Provided public health intelligence to inform equitable vaccine delivery.
- Developed bespoke testing and outbreak management guidance.
- Advised the Council's Safety Advisory Group (SAG) on event plans.
- Delivered communications on the importance of continued safe behaviours.

14. Responding to other emerging health protection issues

14.1. **Post-pandemic surge in infections**

The post-pandemic surge in infections required a heightened response in terms of monitoring levels of infection and meeting competing demands to support outbreak management in the context of:

- An increase in Group A Streptococcus (GAS) infections.
- Norovirus activity that surpassed the 5-season average.
- Intensified circulation of influenza and other seasonal respiratory infections.

14.2. **Monkeypox/ mpox incident**

In response to the wide-scale outbreak of mpox infection in May 2022, the Public Health team worked collaboratively with national teams, the NHS and third sector organisations to reduce spread.

14.3. **National health protection incidents**

Throughout the year, the Council's Public Health team maintained situational awareness of the likely impact of several national incidents on Hampshire residents, such as the detection of poliovirus in London sewage.

14.4. **Infections in migrant populations**

The Council's Public Health team also contributed to the cascading of advice and the health protection response to incidents involving migrant populations across our local area.

14.5. Tuberculosis (TB) and Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR)

Several communication and collaborative activities were undertaken to progress work on TB and AMR. This included system working to respond to complex TB incidents and exploring the impact of changing clinical pathways on antibiotic prescribing.

15. Renewing focus on vaccination, helping shape the National Vaccination Strategy:

- 15.1. A key focus of activity during 2022/23 has been on supporting delivery of seasonal influenza vaccination and recovery of routine childhood vaccination programmes, including MMR vaccination (with the latter being part of the national effort to re-instate the UK's 'measles-free' status).
- 15.2. The Public Health team have also been involved in the development of the new national vaccination strategy, working with partners across the system.

Governance - The Health Protection Board (HPB)

16. Oversight of health protection matters over the past year has been provided by the HPB, which is chaired by the Director of Public Health. The Hampshire HPB met for the first time in September 2022, with the main areas of focus being communicable diseases and vaccination.
17. The Board has brought together Council departments and external partners key to protecting the health of our local population and has been a forum to jointly plan and coordinate activity on health protection issues. Each meeting includes time for a deep dive on a specific health protection topic. Over the course of 2022-2023, these topics have included: health protection matters related to new entrants to the UK (including asylum seekers); TB service delivery; Vaccinations in pregnancy and childhood (opportunities and challenges); Healthcare Associated Infections (HCAIs); AMR and Health Protection issues related to adverse weather.
18. Board administration has been supported by the Council's Public Health team.

Co-Production

19. Co-production activities and processes are integral to the delivery of the Council's health protection duty. Some of the areas of work where co-production principles have been used include:

- 19.1. Gaining insight through public engagement activities that informed the communications strategy to address health protection actions in response to shifts in government policy on COVID-19.
- 19.2. Co-producing the development of communication frameworks with partners to show how they interrelate and communicate with each other across the local health protection system.

Future focus

20. Over the course of the coming year, the Council's Public Health team will continue to retain a strong focus on supporting the health protection system recover from the COVID-19 pandemic and respond to emerging threats.
21. Public Health team activities will be geared up to achieving the health protection ambitions set out in the new Hampshire County Council Public Health Strategy 2023 - 2026.
22. The team will build on public health actions to address the impact of COVID-19 on health outcomes and health inequalities. Projects undertaking this work will be funded using the COVID Outbreak Management Fund (COMF).
23. Council health protection priorities for 2023-2024 are set out below:
 - Support the preparedness for, response, and recovery from health protection incidents.
 - Contribute to the continued recovery of screening and vaccination programmes with a focus on reducing inequalities.
 - Work with the NHS to support national priorities and actions outlined in the Tuberculosis (TB): action plan for England, 2021 to 2026, using local intelligence to inform how we should act.
 - Contribute to AMR programmes and achievement of the 5-year UK AMR Action Plan objectives.

Conclusions

24. The 2022-2023 Health Protection Annual Report has presented a wide range of activities to protect the health of the people of Hampshire over the past year.
25. It sets out future priorities for delivery through joint work with partners across the health protection system with oversight by the Health Protection Board.
26. The report will be published once it has been agreed by the Hampshire Health and Wellbeing Board.

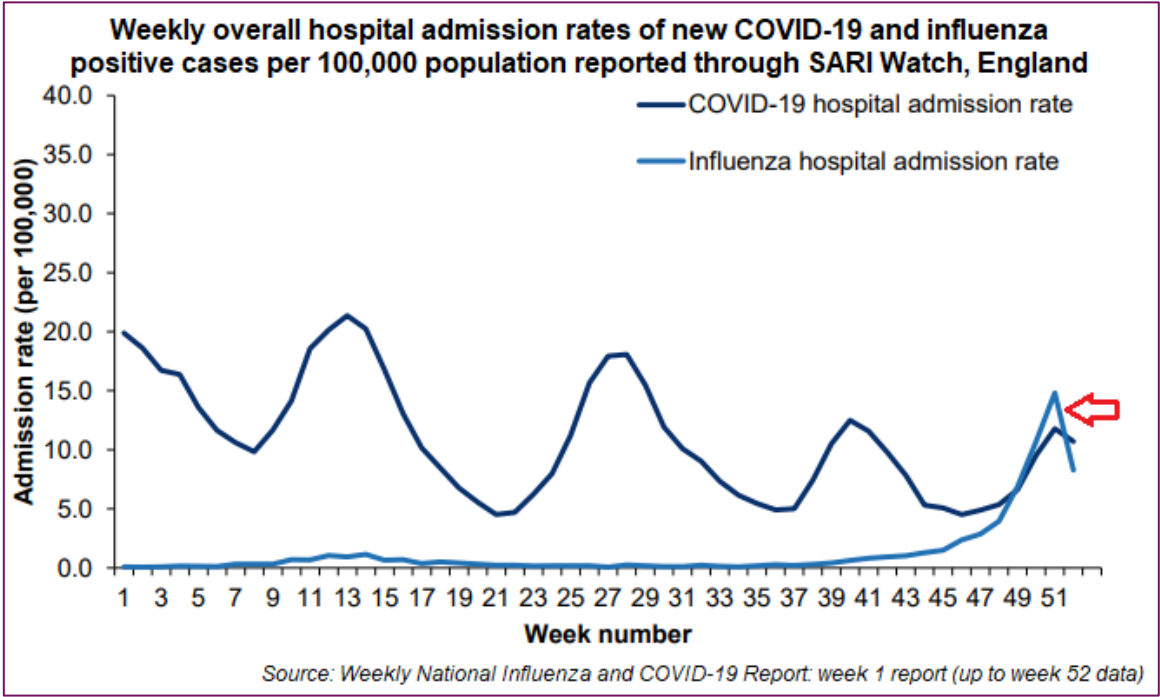
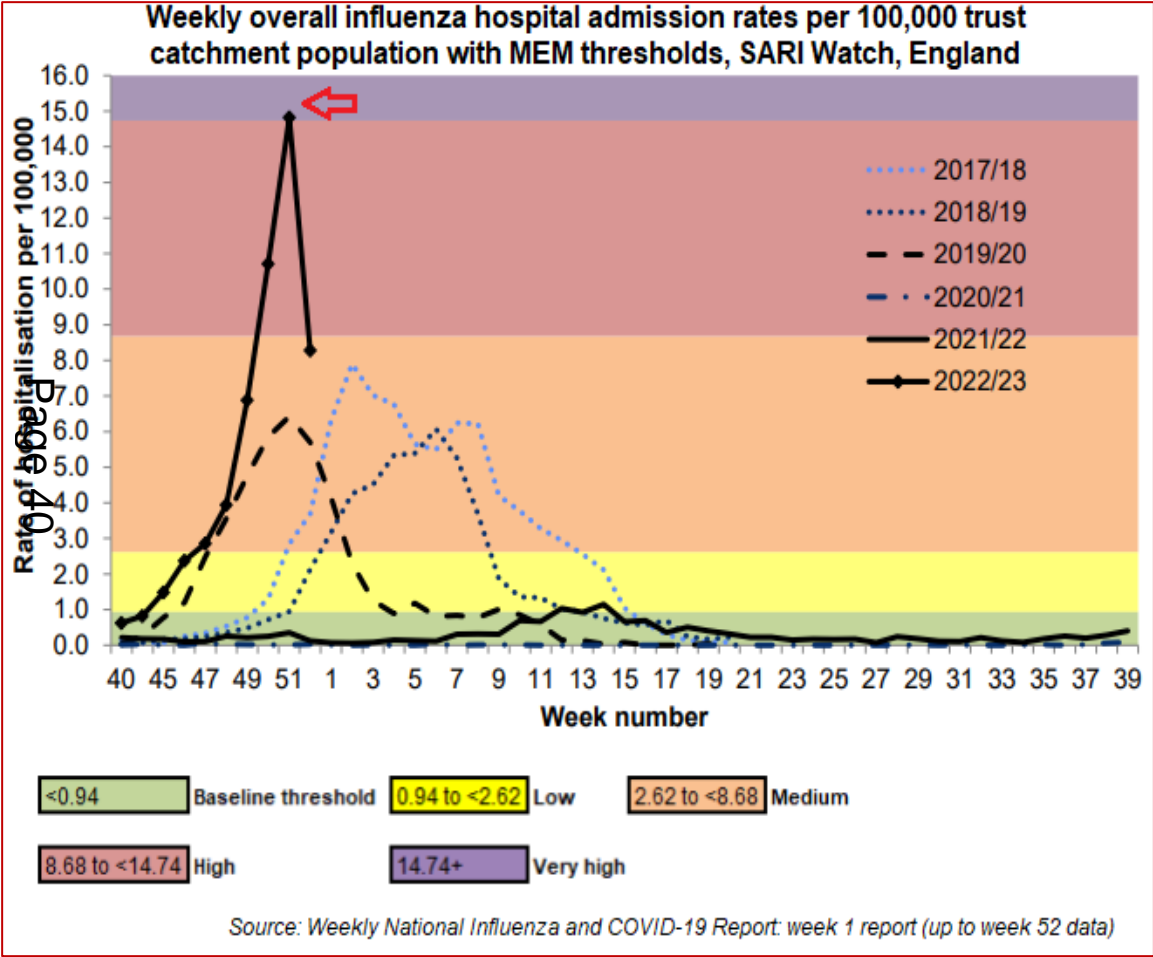
2. Responding to other emerging health protection issues –

- Situational awareness of, and local response to **national health protection incidents**, e.g. detection of Vaccine Derived Polio Virus type 2 (VDPV2) in London sewage, rise in Measles, outbreak of listeria monocytogenes linked to Baronet semi-soft cheese, outbreak of salmonella linked to certain Kinder products, avian influenza.
- Monitored and supported response to **rebound in infections** - Group A Strep, norovirus, influenza, respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) following the removal of COVID-19 mitigation measures, and C.difficile (possibly due to overuse and/or misuse of antibiotics).

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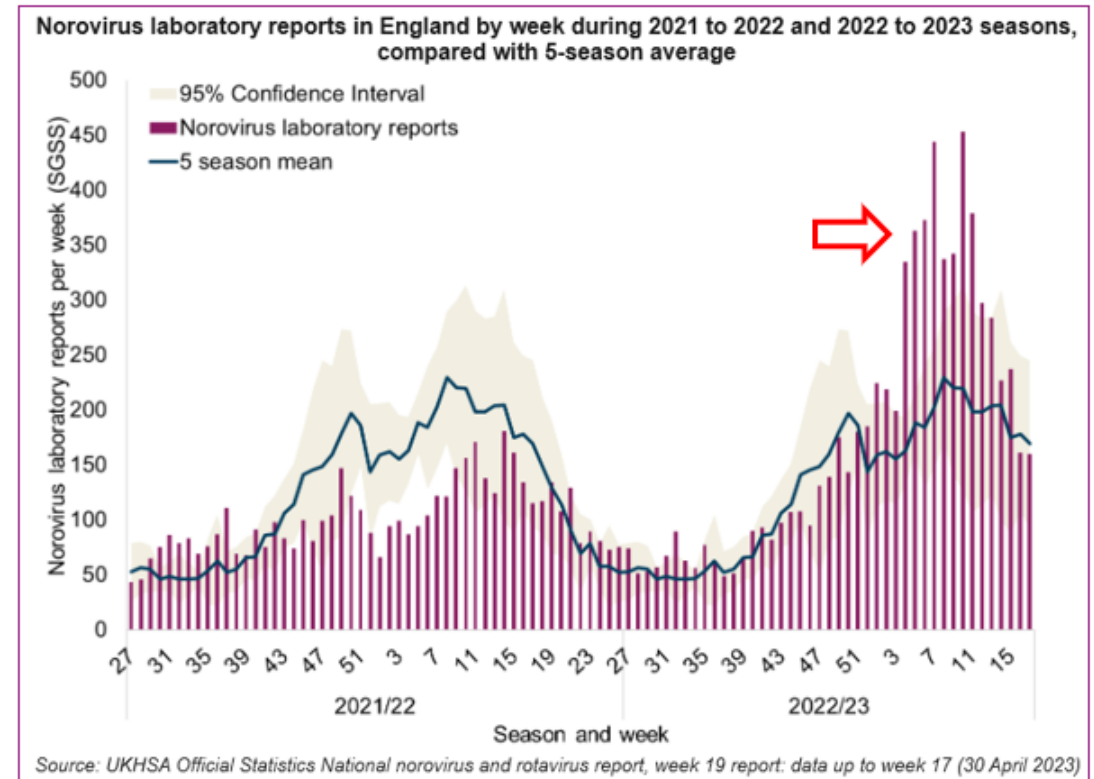
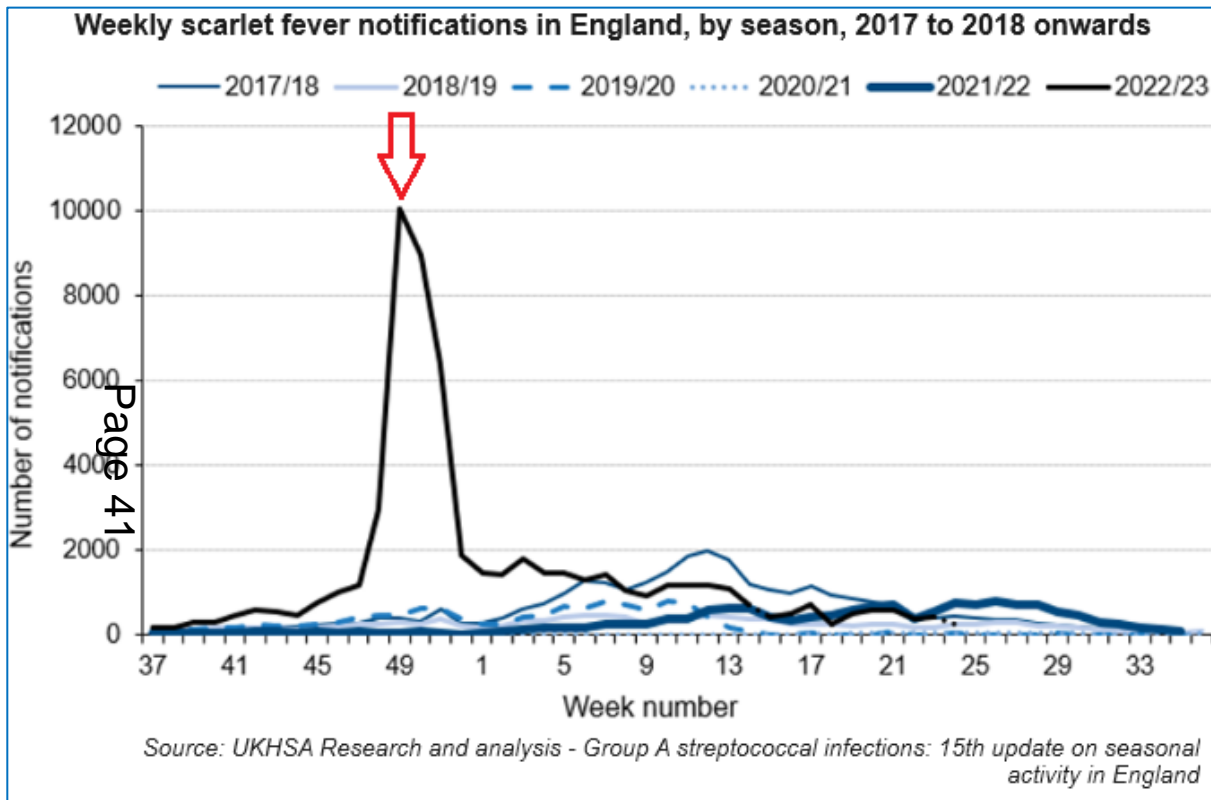
Intensified influenza activity in winter 2022/23

Surge in winter peak norovirus activity in 2022/23 compared to 2021/22 reporting period!

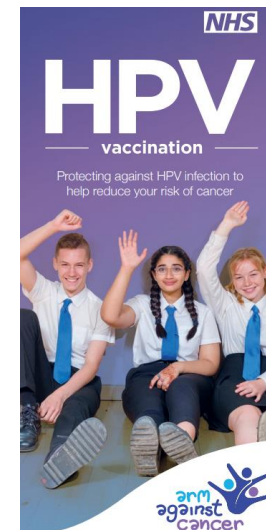

- Sector led improvement work around childhood immunisations in preparation for the proposed delegation of vaccine-related functions from NHSE to ICBs in 2024/25



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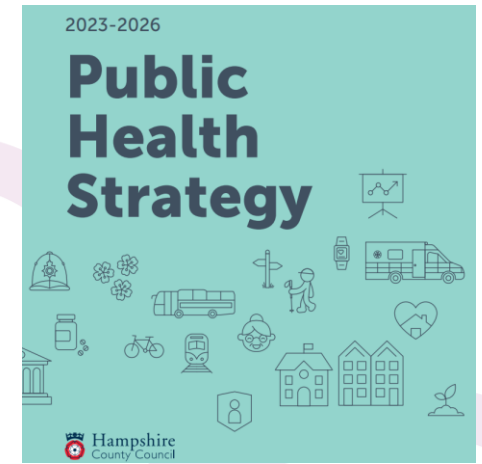
NHS Vaccinations Strategy Programme
