# 600 more police officers

- Support and challenge the CC to ensure the police uplift recruitment programme is delivered.
- Enable new police officers to focus on delivering policing in local communities
- Commission preventative support programmes to reduce crime
- Encourage and monitor use of OOCd in HC
- Develop volunteer groups across HLOW to support policing
- Work closely with volunteer groups such as Neighbourhood Watch, Community Speedwatch and Hampshire Constabulary Special Constables to make the police more informed in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight



600 MORE POLICE OFFICERS BY 2023

600 additional officers represents a 25% uplift in officer numbers. This will therefore make a significant difference in HLOW

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# 600 more police officers

- Of the 20,000 police officers pledged as a part of the officer uplift, Hampshire and Isle of Wight Constabulary were allocated **498**
- This officer uplift is in addition to any other officers retiring/leaving the force.
- By March 2023 we are expected to have **637** in total join the force as a part of the uplift – over achieving my target of 600
- Of the 500 new recruits who've joined (Oct 2022), 60% male and 40% female



600 MORE POLICE OFFICERS BY 2023

57% of new recruits are male  
44% of new recruits are under 26yrs  
90% of new recruits are White British

- Make full use of the HO Safer Streets Fund to invest in preventative measures to help women and girls feel safer in our local communities
- Working with appropriate partners and the police to deliver programmes in schools to combat unhealthy behaviours, challenge gender stereotypes, and campaigns focused on student safety
- Ensure that all victims are given the opportunity to benefit from Restorative Justice

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# Better outcomes for victims

## Effective & Efficient Policing

- Overall satisfaction for victims so far in 2022 sits at 52.1%
- Overall satisfaction for DA victims so far in 2022 sits at 82.9%
- 2,684 victim responses to the victim satisfaction survey in 2022 so far
- 123 victim responses to the DA victim satisfaction survey in 2022 so far

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# Tackling ASB

- Set up and lead an action focused ASB Taskforce

ASB Taskforce has been established, Chaired by the PCC. This monthly taskforce discusses referrals and sets actions including partnership activity and awarding funding

- Work with housing providers to pilot schemes in hotspot areas with young people to divert them away from ASB

The RJ service will accept referrals for offenders of any age. Young people are mainly progressed via YOTs / RJ offers

- Invest in new projects and commissioned services to reduce ASB

16 projects have received investment to tackle ASB across HIOW

- Explore increased use of Restorative Justice for victims of ASB

Through the upcoming RJ tender there is an opportunity to place greater emphasis on victims of ASB, for example raising awareness of the service and referrals from Neighbourhood Policing Teams and CSPs.

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# Tackling ASB

## Effective & Efficient Policing

- Tackling ASB is not just a policing issue, but one that needs a partnership and community response
- ASB has to be tackled at a local level to ensure the roots of ASB are uncovered and tackled leading to future prevention:
  - From the issues with anti-social use of cars and motor cycles in the Portsdown Hill area and the perennial problem of ASB during summer months at the Portsmouth Hotwalls targeted interventions saw reductions in ASB (21.3% in Portsdown Hill and 6% in Hotwalls)



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
