## 1. The decision:

- It is considered that the documentary and user evidence reviewed is insufficient for it to be reasonably alleged that the public have acquired a right of way over the claimed route.
- It is therefore recommended that this application for a Definitive Map Modification Order (DMMO) to record public rights of way in the Borough of Havant (see attached plan), should be refused.

## 2. Reason(s) for the decision:

- The application, which relies on user and historic evidence, was submitted in 2019 by a member of the public.
- Documentary evidence indicates that the route has physically existed since at least the late 18<sup>th</sup> century, but it does not provide any evidence that the route was public. In fact, some of the documentary sources indicate the way was private.
- Analysing the user evidence under Section 31 of the Highways Act (1980) the conclusion reached is that the provisions of The Act have not been satisfied. The evidence submitted is considered to be of an insufficient volume and frequency for it to have been brought to the landowner's attention that a public right was being asserted. The volume and breadth of use is not considered to be representative of the public at large, given the setting of the path immediately adjacent to a large urban area.

## 3. Consultations

Additionally, the County Council Member for North-West Havant Division, Councillor Liz Fairhurst has been made aware of the application.
