Title:	Request to Rescind a Public Path Diversion Order made in 2019 for Part of Hurstbourne Tarrant Footpath 12

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1. The decision:

- **1.1** The purpose of this paper is to seek senior officer decision to rescind a Public Path Diversion Order made in 2019 for the above footpath.
- **1.2** This paper seeks to provide the senior officer with the necessary information with which to determine this proposal. Considering the sheer volume of objections received in response to this Order, it is recommended that the Order, made under s119 of the Highways Act 1980, be rescinded.

Legal Framework for the Decision:

Orders for the Diversion of footpaths, bridleways or restricted byways may be made under Section 119 of the Highways Act 1980, as amended by the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, in the following circumstances:-

"Where it appears to a council as respects a footpath, bridleway or restricted byway in their area (other than one that is a trunk road or a special road) that, in the interests of the owner, lessee or occupier of land crossed by the path or way or of the public, it is expedient that the line of the path or way, or part of that line, should be diverted (whether on to land of the same or of another owner, lessee or occupier), the council may, subject to subsection (2) below, by order made by them and submitted to and confirmed by the Secretary of State, or confirmed as an unopposed order,:

(a) create, as from such date as may be specified in the order, any such new footpath, bridleway or restricted byway as appears to the council requisite for effecting the (2)diversion; and (b) extinguish, as from such date as may be so specified in accordance with the provisions of subsection (3) below, the public right of way over so much of the path or way as appears to the council requisite as aforesaid.

An order under this section is referred to in this Act as a 'public path diversion order'."

Officers must be satisfied that the diverted route will not be substantially less convenient to the public, and must have regard to the effect that a diversion will have on the enjoyment of the path as a whole.

2 Purpose of Report:

2.1 Hampshire County Council made an order to divert part of Hurstbourne Tarrant Footpath No.12 in 2019. This Order attracted many objections which could not be resolved, and the County Council have taken the decision to rescind the order.

3 Background to the Proposal:

- **3.1** Hurstbourne Tarrant Footpath 12 terminates several metres short of the junction with the road, and for many years, access to the road was possible only via a narrow grass strip running next to the village hall car park.
- **3.2** The ownership of this land has recently changed hands, and the new owner, who is redeveloping the hall, has indicated that they would prefer to see the path realigned to avoid conflict with users of the path. The Countryside Service approached the landowner whose field accommodates most of the path to discuss the possibility of a diversion of the path. The landowner agreed to this as long as the whole line of the path was moved to the edge of the field.
- **3.3** Many users of the route felt that this was not as convenient and therefore submitted formal objections to the Order.

4. Recommendations:

4.1. That the (The Hampshire Borough of Test Valley No.23) (Parish of Hurstbourne Tarrant - Part of Footpath No. 12) Public Path Diversion and Definitive Map and Statement Modification Order 2019 be rescinded, and the file closed.

2. Impact on Crime and Disorder:


2.1. It is unlikely that this proposal will have any impact on reported crime in this area.
